UNIFORM POLICY

Aims and Objectives

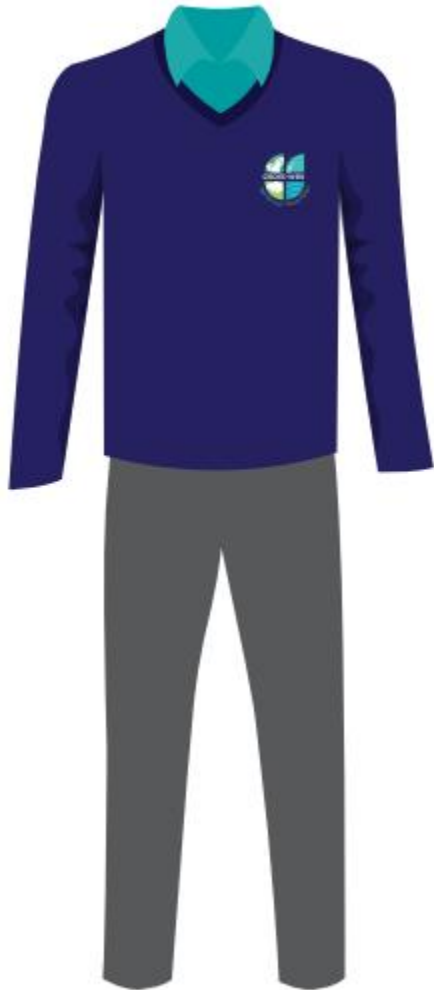
Our aim at Groes-wen Primary School, in encouraging pupils to wear school uniforms is to:

- to create a sense of identity and cohesion in the school and to engage pride and respect in what she achieves
- support positive behaviour and discipline within the school
- ensuring pupils dress appropriately for Learning activities
- breaking down peer pressure to wear clothes from 'planners' fashion
- ensuring that pupils from all backgrounds share the same identity while appreciating that their special requirements are included and respected
- help reduce inequality between pupils and certain factors which leads to bullying
- support and promote the ethos of the school.

School uniform Groes-wen Primary School

The school has an official uniform consisting of a 'jade' polo shirt, a dark blue sweatshirt/cardigan, grey (not black) skirt/dress/trousers. During the Summer Term, the girls may wear a blue summer dress and pupils may wear grey short trousers. Pupils are expected to wear dark (black) shoes (including trainers without 'brand' which are all black) or suitable sandals. Parents/guardians are encouraged to purchase shoes and 'trainers' with 'velcro' for Foundation Stage pupils. We encourage parents to have one branded outfit but otherwise accept the colours from Supermarkets such as Marks and Spencer's, Sainsbury's and Asda.

Examples of the uniform are kept at school. An order form is sent to each family seasonally.

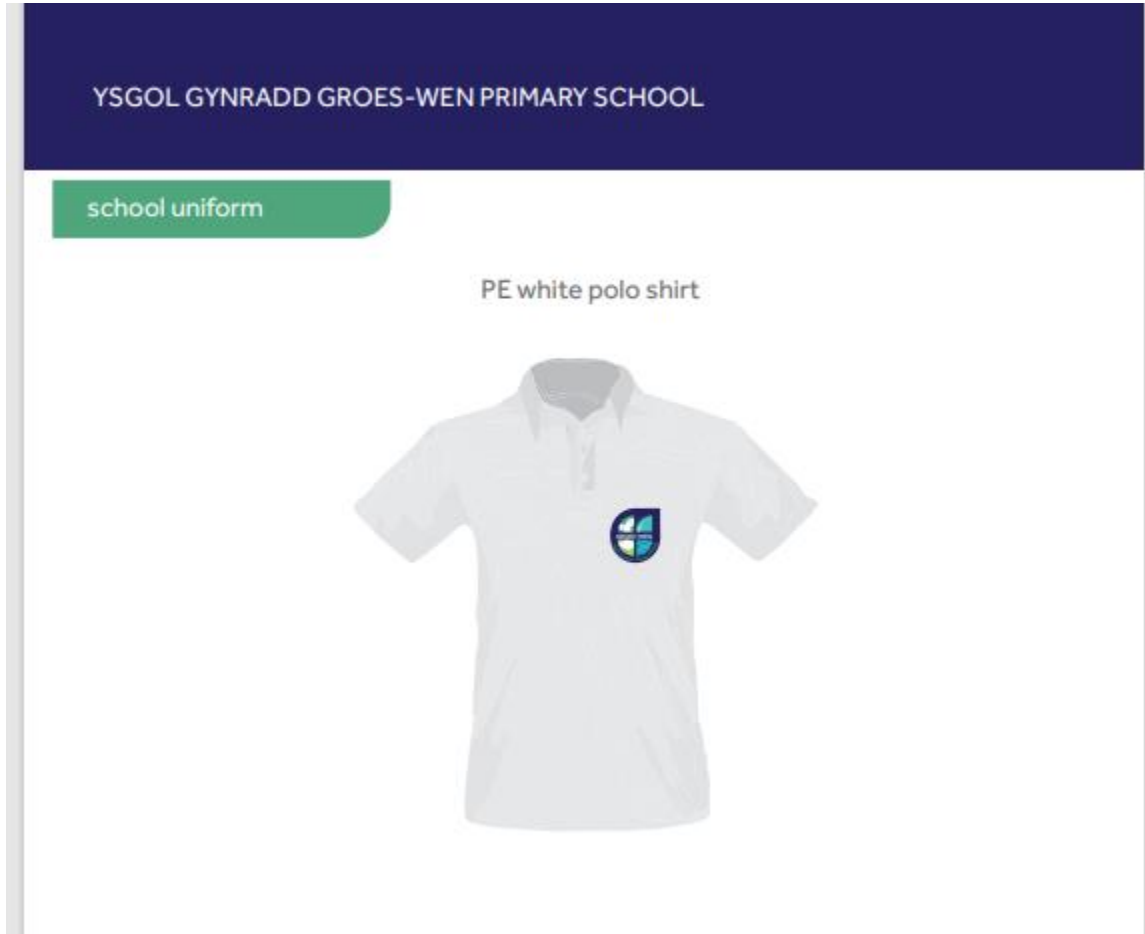

PE Uniform

The school's PE uniform is a white Greek Primary School Physical Education T-shirt and black sports shorts. (The shirt does not require a badge).



During the year, pupils will need "trainers" to achieve different aspects of the subject.

*Parents/guardians are encouraged to place their child(ren) name on all clothing to guarantee that they do not go missing.

Inclusion and Equality:

Religion or creed

The Human Rights Act 1988 protects the right to 'manifest adherence to religion or belief'. Various religions require their followers to comply with a certain dress code or manifest their belief externally. Some religions require their followers to wear religious artefacts or that they dress in a certain way.

It is possible for a number of religious requirements to be met through dress policies school and pupils look. Any request made to vary the policy to meet the needs of individual pupils to meet the needs of individual pupils is carefully considered by the Governing Body to allowed for their religion or belief.

Disability Discrimination

The school uniform and pupil appearance policy does not disadvantage disabled pupils compared to non-disabled pupils. Reasonable modifications will be made to the policy to allow for the requirements of disabled pupils.

Sexual/Gender Discrimination

There is no discrimination on the basis of sex. The boys and girls alike can wear short trousers/ shorts to ensure that any is not disadvantaged compared to the other.

(This is in line with the Equality Policy of Groes-wen Primary School)

Cost of School Uniform

We recognise that school uniforms and other items that will be required to be purchased in accordance with the uniform policy can be a financial burden particularly for those from low-income and large families. An appointment can be made with the Headteacher to discuss any difficulty of payment or concern. The Headteacher will handle each request individually and in confidence. This gives all pupils in the school the opportunity to have equal access to the curriculum.

Apart from the sweaters and cardigan, our school uniform items can be purchased in a wide range of shops. It is not a requirement to purchase a polo shirt with the school logo on it.

Health and safety:

Health and laziness are at the heart of everything we do at school. This is outlined in our pervasive policies.

Jewelry

No jewelry or ear rings may be worn at school. Should any child wish to have an ear ring, parents are encouraged for this to happen during the Summer holidays. Pupils must wear plaster over the earrings during physical education activities.

Medical Affairs

Applications to vary the policy to meet the needs of an individual pupil due to a medical condition or temporary or permanent impairment are carefully considered.

Review

This policy is reviewed every three years or when appropriate in connection with current developments locally and nationally.

This policy is in accordance with the contents of the Welsh Assembly Government Circular Document No: 006/2008.
